1. auspicious (ô spĭsh'əs) [*auspicium* <L. "foretelling the future by bird signs"]

adj. Showing signs that promise success.

The sunny morning was an **auspicious** beginning for our class picnic.

2. introspection (ĭn´trə spĕk'shən) [intro <L. "within," "inward"] *n*. Examination of one's own thoughts and feelings.

Experience may help us to understand others, but without introspection we will never understand our own motives.

introspective, adj.; introspectively, adv.

[retro <L. "backward"] **3. retrospect** (rěťrə spěkť) n. A survey of past times or events.

In retrospect I wish I had chosen an instrument like the flute when I joined the band rather than this heavy, awkward tuba.

4. specimen (spěs'ə mən)

n. A single thing that is taken as an example of a whole category.

The Apollo astronauts gathered specimens of rock to determine the chemical composition of the moon.

5. specter (spěk'tər) n. 1. A ghost.

Local legend claims that the **specter** of a jilted lover haunts the chapel.

2. A haunting fear of future trouble.

After hail destroyed the corn crop, the **specter** of famine loomed over the village.

spectral, adj.

6. spectrum (spěk'trəm); (plural spectra, spectrums)

n. 1. The distribution of characteristics of a physical system, especially bands of colors seen as a rainbow or bands of differing sound waves.

Light refracted through a crystal shows all the colors of the **spectrum**.

2. A wide range of related qualities or ideas.

Congress represents a wide spectrum of opinion.

7. speculate (spěk'ya lāt)

intr. v. 1. To form opinions without definite knowledge or evidence.

Human beings have long speculated about life on other planets.

2. To buy or sell something to make a profit but with risk of loss.

She made and then lost a fortune **speculating** on the stock market.

As soon as a candidate for President of the United States is nominated, he or she is immediately placed under Secret Service **surveillance**.

9. vigil (vĭj'əl)n. A period of staying awake to keep watch or to pray.



Because of her nightly **vigils** at the bedsides of dying soldiers during the Crimean War, the nursing pioneer Florence Nightingale became known as "The Lady with the Lamp."

 vigilant (vĭj'ə lənt) adj. Watchful; on the lookout for danger.

The **vigilant** red-tailed hawks attacked any intruders that approached their nest.
