## CHAPTER 3

## Functions and Linear Equations

## 3-1. Relations and Functions

A coordinate plane is formed by the horizontal line called the $\boldsymbol{x}$ - axis and the vertical line called the $\boldsymbol{y}$-axis, which meet at the origin $(0,0)$.
The axes divide the plane into four parts called quadrants.
An ordered pair gives the coordinates and location of a point. The ordered pairs $(2,1),(-2,2),(-4,-4)$, and (3,-2) are located in Quadrant I, Quadrant II, Quadrant III, and Quadrant IV respectively.

A relation is a set of ordered pairs. A relation can be represented by a graph, a table, or a mapping.
The domain of a relation is the set of all $x$-coordinates and the range of a relation is the set of all $y$-coordinates from the ordered pairs.
A function is a special type of relation in which each element of the domain is paired with exactly one element of the range.

You can use the vertical line test to see if a graph represents a function. A relation is a function if and only if no vertical line intersects its graph more than once.

Function


No vertical line intersects the graph more than once.

Not a Function


A vertical line intersects the graph at two points.

Function


No vertical line intersects the graph more than once.

## Function Values

Equations that are functions can be written in a form called function notation.
In function notation, the equation $y=2 x+3$ is written as $f(x)=2 x+3$.
The function value of $f$ at $x=c$ is denoted as $f(c)$. For instance, if $f(x)=5 x-3, f(2)$ is the value of $f$ at $x=2$ and $f(2)=5(2)-3=7$.

Example $2 \square$ If $f(x)=3 x+2$, find each value.
a. $f(-2)$
b. $f(c-2)$
c. $-2[f(-1)]+f(-2)$
d. $f\left(-\frac{1}{2} x+1\right)$

## 3-2. Rate of Change and Slope

The average rate of change is a ratio that describes, on average, change in one quantity with respect to change in another quantity. If $x$ is the independent variable and $y$ is the dependent variable, then the average rate of change $=\frac{\text { change in } y}{\text { change in } x}$.
Geometrically, the rate of change is the slope of the line through the points $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ and $\left(x_{2}, y_{2}\right)$.
The slope $m$ of a line through $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ and $\left(x_{2}, y_{2}\right)$ is $m=\frac{y_{2}-y_{1}}{x_{2}-x_{1}}=\frac{\text { change in } y}{\text { change in } x}=\frac{\text { rise }}{\text { run }}$.


The standard form of a linear equation of a line is $\boldsymbol{A} \boldsymbol{x}+\boldsymbol{B} \boldsymbol{y}=\boldsymbol{C}$, in which $A, B$, and $C$ are integers.
The $x$-coordinate of the point at which the graph of an equation crosses the $x$-axis is called the $\boldsymbol{x}$ - intercept. To find the $x$-intercept, let $y=0$ and solve the equation for $x$.
The $y$-coordinate of the point at which the graph of an equation crosses the $y$-axis is called the $\boldsymbol{y}$-intercept.
To find the $y$-intercept, let $x=0$ and solve the equation for $y$.
The intercepts of a line provide a quick way to sketch the line.
Values of $x$ for which $f(x)=0$ are called zeros of the function $f$. A function's zero is its $x$-intercept.

Example $1 \quad$ The table at the right shows Evan's height from age 12 to 18 . Find the average rate of change in Evan's height from age 12 to 18.

| Age (years) | 12 | 14 | 16 | 18 |
| :--- | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| Height (inches) | 61 | 64 | 68 | 70 |

Solution $\square \quad$ Average rate of change $=\frac{\text { change in height }}{\text { change in years }}$

$$
=\frac{70-61}{18-12}=\frac{9}{6}=1.5 \text { inches per year }
$$

Example $2 \square$ Find the slope of the line that passes through $(3,-2)$ and $(-5,4)$.
Solution $\square m=\frac{y_{2}-y_{1}}{x_{2}-x_{1}}=\frac{4-(-2)}{-5-3}=\frac{6}{-8}=-\frac{3}{4}$

Example $3 \square \quad$ Find the $x$-intercept and $y$-intercept of $2 x+3 y=6$.

Solution $\quad$ To find the $x$-intercept, let $y=0$.
$2 x+3(0)=6 \Rightarrow x=3 \quad$ The $x$-intercept is 3.
To find the $y$-intercept, let $x=0$.
$2(0)+3 y=6 \Rightarrow y=2 \quad$ The $y$-intercept is 2 .

## 3-3. Slope-Intercept Form and Point-Slope Form

The slope-intercept form of the equation of a line is $\boldsymbol{y}=\boldsymbol{m} \boldsymbol{x}+\boldsymbol{b}$, in which $m$ is the slope and $b$ is the $y$-intercept.
The point-slope form of the equation of a line is $\boldsymbol{y}-\boldsymbol{y}_{1}=\boldsymbol{m}\left(\boldsymbol{x}-\boldsymbol{x}_{1}\right)$, in which $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ are the coordinates of a point on the line and $m$ is the slope of the line.

Example $1 \quad$ The graph of a linear equation is shown on the diagram at the right.
a. Find the slope of the line on the graph.
b. Write the equation of the line in point-slope form.
c. Write the equation of the line in slope-intercept form and find the $y$-intercept.

## 3-4. Parallel and Perpendicular Lines

Lines in the same plane that do not intersect are called parallel lines. Parallel lines have the same slope. If two nonvertical lines have the same slope, then they are parallel.

## Parallel Lines in a Coordinate Plane



Lines that intersect at right angles are called perpendicular lines.
If the product of the slopes of two nonvertical lines is -1 , then the lines are perpendicular.

## Perpendicular Lines in a Coordinate Plane



The slopes of perpendicular lines are negative reciprocals of each other.


Vertical lines and horizontal lines are perpendicular.

Example $1 \quad \square$ Write the equation in point-slope form of the lines through point $(1,2)$ that are (a) parallel to (b) perpendicular to, $3 x-y=-2$.

Solution
a. $3 x-y=-2$
$3 x-y-3 x=-2-3 x$
$-y=-3 x-2$
$(-1)(-y)=(-1)(-3 x-2)$
$y=3 x+2$

Original equation
Subtract $3 x$ from each side.
Simplify.
Multiply each side by -1 .
Simplify.

Parallel lines have the same slope. Replace $m$ with 3 and $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ with $(1,2)$ in point-slope form.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y-y_{1}=m\left(x-x_{1}\right) & \text { Point-slope form } \\
y-2=3(x-1) & \text { Substitution }
\end{array}
$$

b. The line perpendicular to $y=3 x+2$ has a slope of $-\frac{1}{3}$, which is the negative reciprocal of 3 . Replace $m$ with $-\frac{1}{3}$ and $\left(x_{1}, y_{1}\right)$ with (1,2) in point-slope form.

## 3-5. Solving Systems of Linear Equations

A set of linear equations with the same two variables is called a system of linear equations.
A system of two linear equations can have no solution, one solution, or an infinite number of solutions.

## Solving Linear Systems by Graphing

Three types of graphs of linear systems are illustrated below.

## intersecting lines exactly one solution


consistent and independent
coinciding lines infinitely many solutions

parallel lines
no solution


Example $1 \quad$ Solve the system of equations by graphing.
a. $y=2 x$
$x+2 y=5$
b. $-9 x+6 y=12$
$3 x-2 y=-4$

Solution
$\square$ a. $y=2 x$ has the $y$-intercept 0 and the slope 2 . Graph $(0,0)$. From $(0,0)$, move right 1 unit and up 2 units. Draw a dot. Draw a line through the points.

To find the $x$-intercept of $x+2 y=5$, let $y=0 . x+2(0)=5$ implies $x=5$. To find the $y$-intercept let $x=0$. $0+2 y=5$ implies $y=2.5$.
Plot $(5,0)$ and $(0,2.5)$. Then draw a
 line through these two points.

The lines have different slopes and intersect at $(1,2)$.
The solution of the system is $(1,2)$.
b. The slope-intercept form of $-9 x+6 y=12$
is $y=\frac{3}{2} x+2$.
The slope-intercept form of $3 x-2 y=-4$
is $y=\frac{3}{2} x+2$.
Since the equations are equivalent, their graphs show the same line. Any ordered pair representing a point on that line will satisfy both equations.
 So, there are infinitely many solutions to this system.

## Solving Linear Systems by Substitution

The basic steps in the substitution method are as follows:

1. Solve one of the equations for one of its variables.
2. Substitute the resulting expression into the other equation and solve.
3. Substitute the resulting value into either of the original equations and solve for the other variable.

Example $2 \square$ Solve the linear system by substitution method.

$$
\begin{aligned}
& y=x-1 \\
& 2 x+y=5 \\
& \text { Solution } \square \quad 2 x+y=3 \\
& 2 x+(x-1)=5 \\
& 3 x-1=5 \\
& 3 x=6 \\
& x=2 \\
& y=(2)-1 \\
& =1 \\
& \text { Second equation } \\
& \text { Since the first equation is } y=x-1 \text {, substitute } \\
& x-1 \text { for } y \text { in the second equation. } \\
& \text { Combine like terms. } \\
& \text { Add } 1 \text { to each side. } \\
& \text { Divide each side by } 3 \text { and simplify. } \\
& \text { Substitute } 2 \text { for } x \text { in the first equation. } \\
& \text { Simplify. }
\end{aligned}
$$

The solution is $(2,1)$.

## Solving Linear Systems by Elimination

The basic steps in the elimination method are as follows:

1. Arrange the equations with the like terms in columns.
2. Multiply one or both equations to obtain new coefficients for $x$ (or $y$ ) that are opposites.
3. Add the equations and solve for the remaining variable.
4. Substitute this value into either of the original equations and solve for the other variable.

Example $3 \square$ Solve the linear system by elimination method.

$$
\begin{aligned}
2 x-3 y & =13 \\
-3 x+2 y & =-12
\end{aligned}
$$

Solution

$$
\begin{aligned}
\square & 3(2 x-3 y=13) \\
& 2(-3 x+2 y=-12)
\end{aligned}
$$

Multiply the first equation by 3 .
Multiply the second equation by 2 .
By multiplying the first equation by 3 and multiplying the second equation by 2 , we obtain coefficients of $x$ that are opposites.

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 6 x-9 y=39 \\
&-6 x+4 y=-24 \\
& \hline-5 y=15 \\
& y=-3 \\
& 2 x-3(-3)=13 \\
& 2 x+9=13 \\
& 2 x=4 \\
& x=2
\end{aligned}
$$

First equation modified.
Second equation modified.
Sum of equations
Simplify.
Substitute -3 for $y$ in the first equation.
Simplify.
Subtract 9 from each side.
Divide each side by 2 and simplify.
The solution is $(2,-3)$.

## Systems of Equations with No Solution and Infinitely Many Solutions

1. A system of equations has no solution if the two equations have the same slope but different $y$-intercepts.
2. A system of equations has infinitely many solutions if the two equations are equivalent. Therefore the two equations have the same slope and same $y$-intercepts.
When you are asked if a system of equations has no solution or infinitely many solutions, you need to change the equations into slope-intercept form and check the slopes and $y$-intercepts.

Example $4 \quad$ For what value of $c$ will the system of equations below have no solution?

$$
\begin{aligned}
& c x-2 y=6 \\
& 3 x+4 y=4
\end{aligned}
$$

Solution $\quad$ Change the equations into slope-intercept form.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=\frac{c}{2} x-3 & \text { First equation in slope-intercept form } \\
y=-\frac{3}{4} x+1 & \text { Second equation in slope-intercept form }
\end{array}
$$

If two equations have the same slope and different $y$-intercepts, the system has no solution. So, let $\frac{c}{2}=-\frac{3}{4}$. Solving this equation for $c$ gives $c=-\frac{3}{2}$.
Since the lines are parallel and the $y$-intercepts are -3 and 1 , the two equations are not identical. Therefore, when $c=-\frac{3}{2}$, the system of equations has no solution.

Example $5 \square$ For what value of $b$ will the system of equations below have infinitely many

\begin{array}{lc}
\text { solutions? } & -2 x+y=4 \\
& 5 x-b y=-10
\end{array}
$$

Solution

$$
y=2 x+4
$$

$$
y=\frac{5}{b} x+\frac{10}{b}
$$

First equation in slope-intercept form
Second equation in slope-intercept form

If two equations have infinitely many solutions, they are equivalent .
Therefore, $2=\frac{5}{b}$ or $4=\frac{10}{b}$. Solving these equations for $b$ gives $b=\frac{5}{2}$.

Example $6 \square$ Solve the linear system. $2 x-3 y=5$

$$
y=\frac{2}{3} x+2
$$

Solution $\quad$ Substitute the expression for $y$ from the second equation into the first equation.
$2 x-3 y=5$
First equation
$2 x-3\left(\frac{2}{3} x+2\right)=5$
$2 x-2 x-6=5$
$-6=5$
Substitute $\frac{2}{3} x+2$ for $y$ in the first equation.
Simplify.
Simplify.

Since $-6=5$ is false, the system has no solution.

## 3-6. Absolute Value Equations

The absolute value of a number is the distance on a number line between the graph of the number and the origin.
The distance between -3 and the origin is 3. Thus $|-3|=3 . \quad|-3|=3$, because the $|3|=3$, because the
The distance between 3 and the origin is 3 . Thus $|3|=3$. distance from the distance from the origin to -3 is 3 . origin to 3 is 3 .

Therefore, if $|x|=3$, then $x=3$ or $x=-3$.


An absolute value function is a function written as $f(x)=|x|$, for all values of $x$.
An absolute function can be written using two or more expressions such as $f(x)=|x|=\left\{\begin{array}{r}-x \\ \text { if } x<0 \\ x\end{array}\right.$ if $x \geq 0$.

$\frac{1}{3} x-\frac{3}{4} y=-11 \stackrel{\text { Multiply by } 3}{\Rightarrow} x-\frac{9}{4} y=-33$
$\frac{1}{2} x+\frac{1}{6} y=-1 \quad \stackrel{\text { Multiply by }-2}{\Rightarrow} \quad-x-\frac{1}{3} y=2$
Add the equations and we get $-\frac{9}{4} y-\frac{1}{3} y=-31$.
12(- $\left.\frac{9}{4} y-\frac{1}{3} y\right)=12(-31)$ Multiply each side by 12 .
$-27 y-4 y=-372 \quad$ Distributive Property
$-31 y=-372 \quad$ Simplify.
$\frac{-31 y}{-31}=\frac{-372}{-31} \quad$ Divide each side by -31 .
$y=12 \quad$ Simplify.
$\frac{1}{3} x-\frac{3}{4} y=-11 \quad$ First equation
$\frac{1}{3} x-\frac{3}{4}(12)=-11 \quad y=12$
$\frac{1}{3} x-9=-11 \quad$ Simplify.
$\frac{1}{3} x-9+9=-11+9 \quad$ Add 9 to each side.
$\frac{1}{3} x=-2 \quad$ Simplify.
$3\left(\frac{1}{3} x\right)=3(-2) \quad$ Multiply each side by -2.
$x=-6 \quad$ Simplify.
Therefore, $x+y=-6+12=6$.
